

In Rotary, 23 February is our anniversary, and February is also the month when we focus on promoting peace. There is a reason for this: Contributing to peace and international understanding has been a high priority for us since our earliest days.

We are often asked: "How can we get involved in peace now?" There are many paths to peace in Rotary. Our youth programs point us in the direction of Positive Peace, as does the work of intercountry committees and the Rotary Action Group for Peace.

Another path is the Rotarian Peace Projects Incubator (RPPI), an inspirational collaboration among Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Rotary Peace Fellows and alumni. Led by Rotarians in Switzerland and Liechtenstein, RPPI has designed 48 global projects that any club can support, either directly or through Rotary Foundation global grants. Nino Lotishvili and Matthew Johnsen, alumni of the Rotary Peace Center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, are two of the many volunteers.

During my Rotary peace journey, I have learned how personal resilience helps build inner peace and create sustainable outer peace. This was the inspiration behind the Women Peace Ambassadors for the South Caucasus project, which is based on my field research in Georgia. The RPPI team of Rotarians and peace fellows recognized the incredible potential of women from mixed-ethnicity families who live on borderlands to be role models for peace within and beyond their communities. Through workshops on building inner and outer peace that draw on the power of storytelling, 40 participants will be sharing their stories and reaching around 400 extended family and community members. These inspiring but marginalized women will reclaim their inner strength as peacebuilders at the grassroots level. In this way, we will take steps toward the sustainable, peaceful society we need so much, not only in our region, but throughout the world. — Nino Lotishvili

I was excited to join the peace incubator project and to further strengthen my ties with Rotary's peace community by working with past and current peace fellows to develop these proposals. My team wrote five proposals — three in Bangladesh, one in Iraq, and one in Poland — that focus on the arts and on education to generate dialogue across religious divisions and avert the radicalization of young people. I was inspired by how, despite the pandemic, we came together via technology with a vision to develop, test, and strengthen ideas and to produce workable solutions that clubs across the world can support to advance peace. I am excited to work with Rotary's peace community to transform these visions into reality. — Matthew Johnsen

PREPARING FOR ROTARY YEAR 2021-2022

Together with the other nine incoming District Governors and Spouses from the Philippines, Rotary International (RI) District 3800's Governor-Elect Augusto "Augie" Soliman and Spouse Tess will be attending the first-ever online training for District Governors, the 2021 Virtual International Assembly, from February 1 to February 11, 2021. The Assembly aims to prepare incoming District Governors to lead in the year ahead. It also gives opportunities to the participants to build relationship that leads to partnerships, exchanges or collaborations.





This month of February also marks the Pre-President Elect (PRE-PETS) 5, one of the series of trainings or learning and development interventions offered by the incoming district leadership for Presidents-Elect. Scheduled on February 12, 2021, the topic is on Global Grants considering that Maximizing the Utilization of District Designated Fund (DDF) for Global Grants Projects is one of the next Rotary Year's important District Thrusts and Goals. Our DDF is becoming bigger and so we need to take advantage of it, maximize its use, by applying for more Global Grants projects. This thrust will allow us to increase our impact in the communities as our service projects will be made bigger through the DDF facility with the support of foreign partners.

We invited a very knowledgeable District Governor Nominee (DGN) who knows a number of success stories in grant applications, including her rich knowledge and vast experience in helping other clubs in their district succeed in Global Grant

projects. I am referring to DGN Gina Sy of RI District 3820 who is fondly called by friends and Rotarians as "GS". She will expound on the topic: "Ways to Find Foreign Partners for Global Grants Projects".

Below are some of the tips she initially shared for successful global grants applications:

- 1) Community Assessment Make a thorough Community Assessment as all information gathered during the assessment will be used in the application for Global Grant;
- 2) Grant Officer Review Have your Grant Officer in RI or District review first your Global Grant application before submitting it for authorization;
- 3) Hands On Try to be hands on in your Global Grant application. Know or familiarize yourself with the process from start to end;
- 4) Partners Always acknowledge your partners, update them on the status of the project, show them their importance so that by the next time you need their support, they will continue to help you out;
- 5) Feel It Go out and check the impact of your project. See how you have touched the lives of the people in your community, how you have uplifted their lives and feel the fulfillment within you because the feeling of fulfilment is truly priceless; and

6) Ask – Ask whoever can help you with your Global Grant application. Ask partners who might be able to fund your project because if you don't ask, the answer will always be a No.
Lastly, our incoming District Grant Chair, PP Pilar Lee, has suggested to make use of the Global Grant Proposal Form below in applying for Global Grants which include the guidelines to help Rotary Clubs in coming up with their project proposals.

A. ENTRY SPECIFICATIONS/GUIDELINES:

- 1)One entry per club, i.e., Only one (1) picture.
- 2)Collage of pictures is not allowed.
- 3)Picture orientation -- LANDSCAPE ORIENTATION
- 4) Resolution of Picture: 1920 x 1080 pix only
- 5)Entries should be Colored.

6)An entry must be an action picture depicting one of the Seven Causes of Rotary / Areas of Focus —promoting peace, fighting disease, saving mothers and children, supporting education, growing local economies, providing clean water, sanitation and hygiene, and supporting the environment.

7)We recommend that your picture follow the People of Action style and mood requirements:

- The image represents genuine, unstaged moments of Rotarians at work a natural and engaging mood.
- It shows a clear visual narrative.
- Subjects' faces and actions should be positive, happy and engaging.
- If the project has beneficiaries on-site, images of Rotarians interacting with the beneficiaries that represent the work of the project should be captured.
- Two or more people in the frame.
- 8) NO CAPTIONS. A picture must speak for itself.
- 9) Entries that deviate from the above specifications/guidelines will be disqualified.

B. CRITERIA FOR JUDGING PHOTO EXHIBIT:

a. Content - 50%

- Emphasis will be on the 7 Causes of Rotary/Areas of Focus.
- 2 An Action Picture should tell the Rotary story.

b. Visual Presentation - 20%

Resolution of Picture should be 1920 x 1080 pix as specified in the guidelines.

- ② Submit only a STILL picture. Animations, videos or live photos are not allowed.
- 2 Follows the People of Action style and mood requirements.

c. Impact - 30%

- 2 Appeal of the photo exhibit. touches the heart
- ☑ Clarity of the Cause or Area of Focus in the photo one can identify the Cause or Area of Focus being depicted in the photo
- ☑ Exemplary concepts in the presentation something that inspires and motivates the viewer



EXCERPTS OF DG TONIPI'S MID-YEAR REVIEW MESSAGE: THE STATE OF THE DISTRICT BY THE NUMBERS

"As I listened to the reports of the SAGs and our esteemed District Chairs, and as I watched all the wonderful things each of the clubs hav been doing these past 6 months, I was alternately amazed, astonished, awe-struck, and inspired. And have arrived at the unassailable conclusion that the district - and that means all of us - have been doing very well. No, correction, we have done exceptionally well, exceeded all expectations, and broke some records and made history too! and I am so proud to be part of R.I. District 3800, to be the partner of such an exemplary batch of Rotary leaders, and that to have achieved all these and helped so many people in the middle of the existential threat of our time is stunning.

And in order to prove that I am not merely talking off the top of my head, let me present to you hard data to back this up. Here is the state of the district at a little bit over the halfway mark - by the numbers.

- A total of 3,039 Rotarians, a net membership gain of a whopping 316 representing an 11.6% increase the biggest in Philippine Rotary and an improvement over the 8.76% year to date increase last Rotary year.
- 3 New Clubs chartered, including the country's first Passport Club, an eClub and the District's first Satellite Club, with 2 more coming soon.
- 80 out of 103 clubs either growing their ranks or fully retaining their rosters, with a retention rate of 95%.
- Total giving to the Rotary Foundation in the amount of almost 440 thousand dollars (second in the country), with this projected to go past 600 thousand before the end of the year.
- The very first Endowment Fund restricted to an Area of Focus.
- Polio Plus Fund contributions in the total amount of \$3,000, second best in the country.
- 10 End Polio countdown to history clubs.
- Annual Fund contributions at 346 thousand dollars is still tops in the entire country, with 82 out of 103 clubs already categorized as giving.
- 18 New Major Donors, 280 Paul Harris Fellows.
- 5 New 100% All Paul Harris Fellow Clubs (WOW!), 7 EREY Clubs.
- \$6,937.41 raised for Polio Plus from the Takbo Kontra Polio, involving 1,118 runners from 102 Rotary Clubs and a total of 139 Rotary and Rotaract Clubs.
- 8 New Rotaract Clubs, for a total of 83 Rotaract Clubs.
- 1,591 Rotaractors as of yesterday resulting in a net gain of 213, or a percentage increase of 13.4%.
- 4 New or revived Interact Clubs and 73 active Interact Clubs.
- 149 RYLA participants, the biggest in recent history, out of the 220 who had originally registered.
- 104 Club Facebook pages or public groups.
- Almost 50 Club Instragram Accounts.
- 71% of reported Public Image goals of the clubs accomplished.
- 18,715 volunteers, 65,686 volunteer hours, \$4.57 million project funding per Rotary Club Central.
- 70 % of reported Service Project Goals achieved.
- 470,000 students helped by the Turning Readers into Leaders Book Project.
- 3,200 Benficiaries (plus 270 indigent pupils) of the Gulay, Bigas at Telepono Project.
- 6,240 SPED pupils in 84 schools as beneficiaries of the SPED Eskewela Project.
- 2.3 Million Pesos raised over just 2 weeks for Typhoons Rolly & Ulysses victims
- 20 straight days of non-stop Typhoon Ulysses command center operations
- 756 members of the R4R Marketplace in FB
- 3 new RCCs
- 100% of clubs fully paid re: first semester RI Dues, and only 7 are left to settle their District Fund & District Calamity Fund Assessment.
- Roughly 70% of clubs up to date with PRM Subscriptions, a comparatively high figure.
- 73 Strategic Plans submitted, representing 71% of the Clubs to date.
- 1,085 registered for DISCON 2021 as of yesterday, already a record high, 805 of whom are Rotarians and Spouses.





DISTRICT SECRETARY'S (OPERATIONS) REMINDERS

PP Benjie K. Liboro February 2021

By the time this GML goes out, all the clubs should have submitted their Mid-Year Review checklists and rendered their 5-minute reports to the district leadership. Transforming Presidents will be fully aware of what they and their clubs have accomplished, and what remains for them to accomplish.

But just as a reminder, the following are the minimum requirements for a club to qualify for any major district awards, and I quote from the criteria issued by the District Awards Committee:

"For Rotarians and Clubs to be eligible for Major District Awards, the club must be in good standing during the term 2020 – 2021, and must have complied with the following on or before April 30, 2021;

- I. Fully paid with no arrears on the following:
- a. On time payment of R.I. dues with NO WARN-INGS (first and second semester invoices)
- b. District Fund and District Calamity Fund
- c. Subscription to the PRM/ 100% club subscription/ no arrears
- d. Club listing fees for DISTAS 2020, DISCON 2021
- II. Reported to Rotary Club Central:
- a. At least thirteen (13) goals entered by August 30, 2020
- b. Details of Service Projects
- c. Confirmed goals achieved by April 30, 2021
- III. To be presented during the Governor's visit
- a. One (1) project in any of the Areas of Focus with impact. Community Assessment should be part of the presentation.
- IV. To be accomplished on or before July 1, 2020 also to be presented during the Governor's visit
- a. Club strategic planning (Strat plan to be attached with the club plans and programs)
- b. Club Health Check
- c. Club Members Satisfaction Survey"

During the Mid-Year Review sessions, the following were emphasized/clarified, and at the risk of sounding tedious, I would like to remind all Transforming Presidents once again:

1. There seems to be a technical issue at Rotary International regarding the recognition and recording of the first semester R.I. dues pay-



ments of about half of the clubs that make up our district. DG Tonipi is in the process of clearing this up with RI, but requests all Transforming Presidents to look for and keep all payment or remittance receipts evidencing their first semester dues payments, just in case these are needed again for proof of payment.

- 2. In the meantime, clubs are encouraged to kindly settle their second semester RI dues as early as possible, so as to minimize any complications arising from technical problems that RI may be experiencing recognizing and recording payments.
- 3. Deficiencies in settlement of club subscription fees for the Philippine Rotary Magazine (PRM) are the other obligation that can get clubs suspended. So again, kindly prioritize the full settlement of any pending PRM obligations that your club may have.
- 4. Some very few clubs have still not settled their district fund and district calamity fund obligations. Again, kindly settle these as soon as possible, and also remit your DISCON 2021 club listing fees.
- 5. Some clubs have still not uploaded their presidential citation goals in Rotary Club Central, while other clubs have not updated their progress in regard to those goals. April 30, 2021 is an absolute deadline for uploading both goals and accomplishments, but please don't wait till the last minute to do so, because bad things happen when all delinquent clubs all over the world try to access Rotary Club Central at the same time. What a pity if all the good work done by our clubs in this extraordinarily difficult year of the pandemic goes unrecognized because the clubs were deficient in their reporting.

Please try to do so immediately – it's not rocket science – and if there are any problems, do please approach your AGs or PP Joel Guevarra for assistance.

- 6. The same reminder goes out in regard to the impact project and post-project assessment that clubs are required to achieve and report to the district on. Reports should all go to District Secretary Carla Dejeres.
- 7. Finally, some clubs still have not submitted their 3-year strategic plans, their Rotary Club Health Checks and their Members' Satisfaction surveys, and have actually indicated in their Mid-Year reports that they have not done so. These were the first submittals required of our clubs, all the way back to last July 15, 2020 before the Governor's Visits began. Several clubs submitted "strategic plans" covering only one year; these do not qualify. The plans should cover at least three years. Again, you are reminded that without these, your clubs will not qualify for major district awards.

As for other reminders:

- o There are a few clubs whose accomplishment reports due last January 9 have still not been received. You can double-check with DS Carla Dejeres on whether or not your reports have been received and duly accounted for. If not, then please file your report without further delay, or if you had handed it over to your AG, please check with your AG to satisfy yourself that it has been duly transmitted to the District Awards Committee.
- o Now that we are into the new year, all clubs are again enjoined to report their new members to RI. The district crossed the 3,000-member mark before Christmas, but then dipped back below 3,000 as many clubs have implemented their year-end clean ups. Also, not all clubs reported their new recruits before the end of 2020. They are now enjoined to do so, as there is no benefit to delaying further. In any event, we are confident that we will be able to continue growing Rotary even more in the coming months.
- o As mentioned in the last GML, the Rotary

- Club of Marikina South will be spearheading the dis trict project on Rotary's newest area of focus – the Environment. "Balikatan Para Sa Bakawan" addresses what the famous naturalist, David Attenborough, regards as the greatest and most serious environmental tragedy threatening our planet: the progressive loss of our biodiversity. This project goes live on Rotary Day, February 23. On your own, learn why the propagation and preservation of our mangrove forests are so vital, not only to the protection of our marine biodiversity, but also for the protection of our coastal and lowland communities from the ravages of typhoon surges and the rising of ocean levels. A plot consisting of ten (10) mangrove plants is the smallest unit a club or individual can sponsor, at a cost of only P1,500. So please support this worthy project, especially if your club has not yet accomplished any project this year under Rotary's seventh area of focus, the Environment.
- o Again, a heads-up on TRANS4MATION, and in particular, the 4-Way Test video contest. For details, please get in touch with PP Annette Lee of RC San Juan del Monte or PP Ricky Bautista of RC Marikina Hilltop.
- o Finally, we urge all our Rotarians and Spouses/Partners to support D-3800's DISCON 2021 which will be held on March 25-27. Attendance will be free of charge and it will be staged on an online platform, and will be a joint district conference with our Rotaract clubs. You can demonstrate your support by participating in the Talent Night and the Governor's Ball which could be truly unique as the only virtual events of their type that we will ever experience, assuming that some semblance of normal life will be restored by March 2022, and by placing an ad in the souvenir program to help defray costs.
- o Please be reminded that February is Rotary's Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month. If you do not have your own club project addressing this Area of Focus, you may attend the Anti-Human Trafficking Webinar hosted by RC Pasig on February 16, 2021 (Tuesday) 5:30 p.m., at Zoom.
- o RI's exchange rate remains at 48:1 to the peso.

- 1) The RI Invoice for the second semester of RY 2020-2021 is available. Please pay your club's RI dues as reflected in the invoice to ensure that your club is in good standing.
- Clubs are required to pay the balance upon receipt of the invoice.
- As of January 2015, clubs are subject to termination for nonpayment of dues 120 days after the club invoice is issued.
- Find your club invoice in the Club Finances section of Club Administration.
- Make the check payable to Rotary International and include your club's name and number and the invoice number on it.
- Email a copy of the club invoice with proof of your payment (deposit slip) to rosalyn.ong@rotary.org. Find your Daily Club Balance Report in the Club Finances section of Club Administration. The information in this report is updated daily and will reflect recent payments and member adjustments.
- 2) Ensure payment of your subscription to The Philippine Rotary Magazine including those for previous years. First time subscribers should submit their subscription form plus payments.

3) All Rotary Clubs should ensure that all members are continuously engaged with their respective clubs. We highlight and encourage attendance in home club. Should your club have concerns with virtual meetings or hybrid meetings, kindly get in touch with PP Joel Guevarra, District Chair of Online Tools Committee for assistance.

Best practices for online meetings

As the organizer, online meetings come down to two essentials: technology and content.

1) Stick to meeting basics

Use an agenda, set ground rules, and clearly outline next steps at the end of the meeting. If background information is required, share it beforehand.

2) Rethink your meeting

Adjust your content to maximize the online format. For example, fellowship time could become online breakout rooms where members socialize in small groups.

Choose the best tech Before selecting a platform, consider the equipment members may or may not have.

3) Rehearse Practice with presenters so they know how to request control and share their



screens. Log on early to test audio and make sure all presenters are on.

4) Make it accessible

Not everyone can join via video. Provide an audio option and consider recording the meeting to share later. Inform participants the meeting will be recorded, so they can switch off their cameras if they prefer.

5) Keep it engaging

Minimize presentation length and maximize discussion. Use polls, Q&A, and other tools that focus participant attention on the content and each other.

6) Ask for support

Build a team to monitor chat boxes, answer questions during the meeting, and troubleshoot technical issues. Solicit feedback from participants and adjust accordingly. Your club provides your members with a feeling of belonging and opportunities for personal growth. You can continue to engage members even in a virtual setting.

Many of the traditional rules and requirements that Rotary clubs have had historically, such as weekly meetings, attendance requirements, morning or lunch meetings, traditional classifications, and high costs, have limited who is able or willing to join. When we join together different perspectives and backgrounds, professions and areas of expertise, talents and resources, we can see challenges in new ways and identify creative solutions.

Any Rotary club wishing to try a new approach can do so by amending its bylaws as permitted by the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. But clubs can also continue to follow their current requirements for meetings, attendance, structure, and categories of membership. Have a conversation with your club members to determine whether flexible options can help to address your club's membership needs.

Meeting format

Clubs are demonstrating innovation and flexibility by replacing the traditional speaker and meal meeting format with a variety of new formats. Some clubs are rotating where they meet by holding gatherings in a member's home, a local restaurant, or other "offsite" locations such as a local business. Some clubs are meeting virtually or allowing some of their members to call into the in-person meeting. Many clubs are using meetings to plan and conduct their service projects and fundraisers, and having social events to get to know other members better. Consider surveying your members to see what new formats they would be interested in.

Changing the meeting format not only gives members a variety of club experiences, but also keeps them engaged and active in the club. It can also be more appealing to guests to have hands-on, fun, productive meetings that connect with Rotary's values and mission. This form of flexibility also makes it easier for some members to attend meetings virtually when they would not have been able to attend in person.
